




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



Standard Do 335 camo pattern














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Notes on Specific Aircraft



All aircraft

- The specific Do 335 aircraft have been identified differently in various published sources, which has led to considerable confusion over time as to which aircraft was which. We have used the identifications listed in Creek, Smith & Hitchcock's Dornier 335 Arrow, Monarch #2, by Monogram Aviation Publications, published in 1977. This is the latest and certainly best researched book on the Pfeil, and we accept their judgements.
- While camouflage colors are uncertain, we've shown these Arrows in the 'standard' scheme of Dunkelgrün and Hellgrün. As these were prototypes and test aircraft, old color stocks would have likely been used as well (RLM 70 & 71). We invite the modeler to review the excellent photos of these subjects in the books listed and draw their own conclusions.

AM 225

 Although surrendered to US forces at the Dornier Oberpfaffenhofen factor near Munich, this aircraft was test flown several times by British Air Intelligence. This aircraft was unpainted (except for the front power egg) and most likely never delivered to the Luftwaffe from the factory. After a few test flights at Merville, France, it landed with the nose gear still retracted and it was eventually written off at Merville.

VG+PH / #102

- Captured at the Dornier Oberpfaffenhofen factory, this bird was tested by the US Navy and charged off on 31
 March 1947. It was stored at NAS Norfolk, Virginia, until 1961 when it was acquired by the Smithsonian
 Institution's National Air and Space Museum. It was stored at NASM's Silver Hill, Maryland, facility until 1974, when
 it was shipped to Germany for restoration by its original manufacturer. After a period on display at the Deutsches
 Museum in Munich, it was returned to the US.
- Odd as it seems, absolutely no color demarcation lines can be seen in any of the available photos fo this Pfeil. We
 belive RLM 83 would have been the most likely overall color, but it could also have been 70, 71, 81, etc. Once captured by the American forces, the German markings were painted out, probably with Olive Drab and Neutral Gray
 paint. Interestingly, over time the overpainting faded and chipped, and the original Luftwaffe markings were once
 again fairly clearly visible! The US star-and-bars were hastily applied and definitely non-standard.

Applying the Decals

You probably already know all this stuff, so feel free to use your regular process; however, if you're new to aftermarket decals, here goes:

- Generally, use the Microscale Finishing System. We don't recommend extremely strong decal solvents such as Solvaset.
- Your model must have a smooth, glossy surface, as decals won't adhere well to matte surfaces. Use gloss paints or your favorite clear gloss overspray over matte or semigloss paint.
- Cut each subject out without trimming off the slight excess film (this helps the decal film disappear when dry).
- Put the decal in warm water that has a drop or two of liquid dishwashing soap or photo-flo for 10 seconds.
- When the decal will slide off the backing paper without forcing it, apply it to the proper position on your model.
 Slide the backing paper out from underneath.
- Gently blot off excess water and smooth out bubbles under the decal surface. If you wish, carefully brush on a mild decal softener such as Micro-Sol.
- When all decals are completely dry, gently wash off all excess decal adhesive.
- Finally, overcoat your model with a good quality gloss coat, followed by your choice of matte or eggshell clear topcoat.
